Speaking a Few Words in Kingston - A Little Scene at Brockville - Settling Accounts.

The members of "Her Majesty's Minstrel," enjoyed themselves yesterday and last night. Some of them were very tired, having had no sleep for days.

The company has not been in existence for many weeks, but it has good dates ahead, covering a period of 27 weeks.

Mr. Polson eventually came out of the alley victorious, and Polson paid the bill with cash. Abbot was arrested and fined \$5, leaving his silver watch and chain with the Chief as security for the amount.

Public School Items.

Attendance of Pupils - A Change of Books - Copying New Program.

The prices of the Royal Canadian Bankers (still unauthorized), however have been greatly reduced.

Chairman Walsh has been notified by the board of education to attend to his official duties. He is still very weak.

Drawing is to be continued in the schools. That's right. Public school pupils should have all the advantages which a slight expenditure of money can secure for them.
