

The streets were crowded with pedestrians. About 8:20 o'clock the gas flickered in a sickly way. Some business men sent their employees hurry to examine the meters and were astonished and non-plussed when tolo Please, sir, the gas is turned on in full. And so it was, still deeper and deeper became the gloom, soon the lights went out and total darkness reigned supreme The people in the crowded stores with as much haste as possible groped their way to the streets, and with some difficulty found their way home. The mer chants were angry and heaped impreca tions upon the heads of the unfortunate Gas Company. All the dilapidated coal oil lamps and lanterns in the city were resurrected and pressed once more into service. Candles were also utilized and many a cash book was made up by the use of one of these now despised illum nators.
