Last season the association supported five laborers in the mission field. becoming responsible for their salaries. During the coming season one more will be added to the number, making six in all, one of these going to the North-West. The students sent into the field by the association are in addition to those placed by the House Mission Commutee of the Presbyterian Church. A considerable portion of the funds necessary for carrying on this work is raised upon the different mission fields, but as here is always a deficit it was deemed advisable this session to supplement the association's revenue by instituting course of lectures. One lecture was given (that of Rev. J. S. Black, of treal) which was attended with moderate success. Subsequently it was decided to appeal to the generosity of the friends of the association in this city, and a committee was appointed to canvass for subscriptions. This committee made only partial canvass, and ceased their labors when they found that they had sufficient funds to meet the present needs of the association.
