Lecture by Dr. May, Ottawa. The lecture delivered in Convocation Hall last evening by Rev. John May, Public School Inspector of Carleton County, was one deserving of a better audience. The speaker, while not given to much rhetorical displays, put his remarks in such a racy style as to retain the close attention from his auditors. upon the defects of the system which Canadians are so boastful of. 
