There are many believers in the doctrine enunciated by Rev. John May in his address before the County Teachers' Association on Friday evening lastthat oral as much as written examinations should be made the test of merit. Mr. May had reference, of course, to the ordeal to which so many submit in or der to become qualified teachers, but the same principle is applicable to all methods for ascertaining solid liter ary results. The matter is just now receiving more than the usual attention the late rigorous collegiate "grind" hav ing demonstrated wherein many a one's weakness lay. It is argued that when limited to time a candidate becomes oceasionally excited and confused, and finds himself unable to express his thoughts in writing with that conciseness so essentially necessary in order to convey to the examiner's mind a favorable impression of the writer's ability. Some are not so ready with the pen as with the tongue, and failing in the one case are not always given the opportunity to remove doubts and prejudices by an oral display. Mr. May, as an old teacher and present Inspector of Schools, spoke from experience, and laid down his views with emphasis. Whether fruit ful of result, beyond a cursory discussion of the question, however, remains to be

AN INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

The worst use a community can put money to is to endow a public institution too well with it. In the very struggle for existence there is life for every fibre of benevolent organizations. plethoric Lurse is apt to lead each sup porter to imagine that his or her active interest is no longer necessary, and soon sealfor nearly all drop into comparative indifference. Of late years the opera tions of the Midland District School Society have languished, though it has had ample means through its steady income to carry out the objects of its creation, the training of an ill-cared for class of children who never reach the public schools. Though the Orphans Home, House of Providence, and other local charities have had to beg for funds they are still healthful and vigor ous, while the ragged school has declined. The trustees of its funds have for some time sought to transfer them to some active committee or association, negotiations with the Orphans Home having taken place last year, but not successfully. A new project is now mooted, quite within the terms of the Lancasterian School endowment. The trustees offer to hand over this property to either city or government, provided it will erect an industrial school, say apon the Normal school lot on Union Street. The school law provides and encourages such an institution. It would be a positive benefit to the community. also, for a census of the city has again and again shown a large proportion of children who do not attend school, and who should be made to do so, especially if it had an industrial character. We presume the institution would be of semi provincial character and draw pupils from the whole Midland District, thus entitling it to regular government assistance. Correspondence is now taking place with the Hon. Oliver Mowat, and we hope a more vigorous concern will arise out of the movement than the

present Lancasterian school.

A GREAT FRAUD. It is a matter for very general com ment that while the Government and their supporters have boasted that the national policy made their popularity greater than they had ever calculated a fraud so extensive as the Gerrymander ing Bill should be adopted as the only means of success in the next elections. How silly in the light of recent exper ience is Sir John's talk about the tall chimpies, how ineffectual Sir Leonard's labour in calculating industrial statistics, how absurd Dr. Orton's agricultural commission! There is little attempt made to defend the trick. It has been stated that the Premier aimed at representation by population and that the Opposition cannot consistently object when in the past they have been ardent advocates of that principle. The Reform party have contended for representation by population, but on an equitable basis, cities and counties being granted one or more additional members according as the number of their voters increased but Reformers have never been insame enough to favour the rascally poli tical jobbery which is now being perpetrated by those whose history shews that their's is a fight for office and power not for principle and the right. Why. the Registribution Bill will not fairly bring about representation by population. even though as many as fifty-two constituencies have been so mangled as to have almost lost their municipal lines. From beginning to end the object of the bill is to neutralize the Liberal vote-to manipulate it so that if anticipations be realized the new House will be constitated of representatives of a minori. ty; and yet such a thing, once referred to m a different sense by Hon. Mr. Blake, was considered a fit subject for the ridicule of the Tory press. The most serious aspect of this gerrymandering is the unfortunate precedent which it establishes. Despite their scheming Sir John and his corrupt colleagues cannot always remain in officethough they would if they could-and their successors can not be blamed if they undertake a similarly outrageous piece of legislation. What will follow if the present bill pass? We can only conjecture and surmise, remembering what desperate politicians have essayed in the past. Unless the voters, now seemingly thoroughly aroused and in the proper mood to resent result, feel it incumbent upon them to check public wrongs when they have a chance, greater iniquities may occur, and the future of a promising country may be
