Lendon, May 18 .- Mr. Parnell is now shadowed by detectives, and a plain clothes man keeps watch and ward be fore his lodgings. It is said that the same precautions are observed in the case of Mr. Davitt, and that Mr. Dillon has received several threatening letters. The Home Secretary has long been in receipt of such communications. Since the assassination he has received more than the average daily number, some evidently hoaxes, others apparently from Fenians, all threatening his life One bearing the New York postmark, adverting to the fact that he had 'mar ried an American woman, averred that a solemn vow had been registered by the New York Fenians to be avenged on the British Government through him for the "murder of the Manchester martyrs." The Home Secretary's official residence, as well as his private house, are kept guarded by the police, and a detective is always within hail of him when he goes abroad. The Lord Mayor of London has also been put in dread by what may turn out to be dynamite fiend. A suspicious looking canister has just been discovered by the police outside the Mansion House. It to-day was removed with the greatest caution, and will be examined to-morrow. The canister was suspended by a hook the railing in the front or the building. A lighted fuse, which was attached it, was extinguished by the policemen on duty. The box is believed to be full of gunpowder. The police around the Hansion House and other city buildings have been doubled, and many of the reserve have been called out. All are armed with revolvers.
