The ACCUSED OF INCENDIARISM.

It was generally believed that the fire was the work of an incendiary, and this morning a young man, a relative of Mrs. Scanlon, was taken to the police station and detained until the Magistrate arrived, to whom he gave account of himself. The chagrined "suspect" declared his innocence. His statement was: Last night, before 11 o'clock, he was on Ontario street in company with another. Afterwards he went to a "wake," and remained there for some time. He had got as far as Gorestreet, on Wellington, when he heard the alarm sounded and saw the blaze. He rushed up the street, jumped over the fence, and endeavored to get the cows out, but this was an impossibility. He was, afterwards accused of starting the fire Scanlon until about two weeks age. The Magistrate took the names of the persons at the "wake," and the police will lay the mutter before the County Attorney, who may order an enquiry. After an explanation the young man was dismissed.


