the 14th P. W. O. Rifles we get to an

important period in the history of the militia force. Away back on the 30ths there was no organization, but annually the volunteers met and had a parade, vet made no pretensions in regard to drill. The finest efforts at company service were not successful. At that distinct period politics ruled in every thing, and they prevented the carrying out of orders which were designed to put the militia on a more solid and serviceable footing than it had prior there though the veterans had shewn great levotion and loyalty to their country No. I was the first volunteer company formed on a new basis in this city. was the nucleus of the 14th P. W. O. Rifles. When it took shape the Gov eroment furnished the arms and side belts; the men furnished their own upi ferros, shell jackets of fine black cloth, black cloth pants with broad military braid, and stiff cloth caps. They also had patent leather pouches, something like those now carried 'by the officers. The company was commanded by Capt. D. A. Shaw, First Lieutenant J. Minnes Second Lieutenant Stephen Wright (brother of Mrs. S. Anglin;) D. Callaghan, who was afterwards Cotonel of of the regiment; Dr. J. K. Oliver, who became Surgeon Major; Mayor Gaskin, Mr. W. Alien and many others who have been or are leading citizens, entered the ranks as subordinates and rose by rapid promotions. Mayor Gaskin claims to have been the crack shot of the company for three years. The first arch and dress parade of the gallant corps was on the occasion of the reception of Jul Regiment on their return from the crimea. Later on No. 2 company was formed, and placed under command of 148 late Capt. J. and Lieut. P. O'Renly. They were a very dressy Company, hav ing him black uniforms with green fac ings, and green plumed hats. 
