Edward Sullivan, D.D., Bishop elect of Algoma, at St. George's Church, Montreal, on Thursday, June 29th. The Right Rev. Bishop Coxe, of Western New York, one of the ablest men in the church at large, will deliver the ser mon. That the honor was committed to Bishop Lewis has given great plea sure to the members of the Synod, who though confident in their estimate his commanding ability, are proud to see it recognized by his episcopal associates. His Lordship presides over a diecese exhibiting, above all others in Canada, a warm missionary spirit, judged by its growth as a branch of the church within the past twenty years, and there fore it is fitting that he should be the medium of conveying to the latest popular choice of the church the apostolic commission.
