ENIGMATS IN CANADA.
Two emigrants from Massachusetts, who succeeded in procuring work in the factory here yesterday, so that these can be being assisted in their passage here to the extent of \$5, as is claimed by the Government, they were landed in Brockville for three months, from the time they left Massachusetts. They were the friends of their passage paid to Gananoque, some to Kingston and other points west.
In Massachusetts the emigrants are placed with advertisements in the Canadian emigration agents to the effect that in Canada mechanics can earn five dollars per day, and common laboring men two dollars and a half, and the announcement is also made that they can have their passage paid, so that these can be most of these men whole families, men, women and children, are brought to this country at the expense of Canada and landed here, many of them without a cent. They are to stay for three months, and the Government pays the balance of their passage, including board to their destination, amounting to those dropped off in Brockville to about three pounds, six shillings or fifty dollars more. That is, in other words, twenty-five emigrants, unable to procure work at any price, were sent to the United States, after the Government had paid their expenses to Brockville.
Nobody has any objection to emigrants from Europe if they are of the right class, but there is no demand, no room in Canada for men who have no money enough to pay their own passage. We want to see emigrants with means to take up land in the North-West, but we do not at present want men who are willing to work for their board. If this thing continues wages are bound to come down, and they will have a family to live on, with all the necessities of life as high as they are at present.
Emigrants to the United States, not only have to pay their own passage, but in addition are obliged to pay a tax on landing in New York, and if we cannot get emigrants to come here without bringing them to do so they are just as well away.
A Polar Empire
A wonderful proposal has been made by a Professor in America, which, if carried out in its main parts would enable a vast area of the present uninhabitable polar regions to become habitable and civilized. The following appears in the *American Review*:—"The largest part of the Arctic is now a vast waste with a depth of 500 to 1000 fathoms, but is obstructed by three small islands in the middle of the channel. After the experience already gained by our engineers in the removal of these islands and perhaps of the rocks and reefs along the shore which offer most impediment to the current, would be of no very great difficulty, and considering the advantage which Professor Shaler thinks would be derived from the excavation of the earth would unite in giving to the work the money, men, and energy which they now employ in keeping the sea ready to fight with the United States navy. If the plan is placed at their command by modern science, they could make an artificial channel, which would let enough of the Japanese current through to melt the ice of the polar seas, and thus create a vast empire of ice. By the same means the climate of all North America would be changed. The Arctic winds of winter, which keep British Columbia for the most part an uninhabitable waste, would be changed, and a part of the power of the Gulf of Mexico, would cease, while the violent heat of our summers would be greatly tempered. Even those European nations which have so long been a burden to the world, might contribute to the cost, for the sake of the open north west passage to Asia, which the change of climate would give, while Great Britain, Russia, and the United States, which have long been at enmity on the Straits, could well afford to expand great efforts to complete a work which if Mr. Shaler tells us is true, would be in the end be so profitable."
