Stamping Out a Practice

The convicted robbers, Joseph Miller and Charles Webb, were brought up for sentence vesterday. Mr. Justice Cameron was on the Bench. The sentence had been deferred for some days to give the convicts an opportunity to produce whatever evidence they might have of previous good character. But no evi dence was presented. Judge Cameron briefly recapitulated the character of of the offence and the conclusive evidence of their guilt. In determining the extent of their punishment he said it was desirable to stamp out the practice which prevailed to some extent of organ ized parties coming here from the United States on purposes of plunder. The prisoners were sentenced to three years each in the Kingston Penitentiary. The third prisoner, Wilson, is at present out

Submission of Plans to the Building Committee-Work 7 but Has Been Undertakes.

Yesterday afternoon a meeting of the Committee on Accommodation for the Provincial Fair was held, and the plans as prepared by Architect W. Newlands ir., adopted. Orders were given that tenders be immediately asked for. The principal new erections will be: The building for the Manitoba exhibits, to occupy a space in the north east corner of the grounds adjacent to the band stand. The Provincial Association will

The new carriage sheds, 250x24 feet and situated on the porthwest side of the grounds nearly opposite to the build lection was very pretty and very inter-

ing for the Manitoba exhibit. The dairy building, 60x80 feet. It will be located south of the entrance gate, on the east side.

The poultry house, to be arranged so as to give accommodation to 400 coups. A stove building, 80x24 feet, immeliately south of the parace, and about


