MONTREAL TO FORT WILLIAM. Up the Lakes - His Reception by

the Kingstealane. Yesterday at 11:30 o'clock the propel ler California, (Capt. Vaughn), arrived at Swift's wharf. She had aboard the Canadian lighthouse supplies, and Commodore Patrick Harty, the genial Light house Inspector. The vessel left Montreal on Thursday for the annual tour to all the lighthouses between Montreal and Fort William, Lake Superior. The trip will consume seven weeks. During the winter, it may not be known, the various lighthouse keepers along the Canadian coast send a list of their requirements to the Marine Department at Ottawa. These are carefully noted in a book, and when the trip is made each lighthouse is supplied according to its

Inspector Harty has one hundred and three lighthouses under his supervision the following being between Gananoque and Toronto: Jack Straw, Spectacle Shoal, Burnt Island, Brown's Point, Smoke Island, Nine Mile Point, Pigeon Island, Point Pleasant, False Ducks, South Bay Point, Long Point, Petre, Scotch Bonnet, Presqu Isle, Weller's Bay, Gull Island, Frenchman's Bay and Gibraltar Point. As each lighthouse is visited the stores turned over are care fully checked and the lighthouse keeper signs a book acknowledging their receipt. The boat is laden with these supplies, which consist of coal oil, paint oil, white lead, paints of various kinds and colours brushes, wicks, brooms, burners, towels, matches, chamois skins, funnels, tin cans, coal oil cans, soap, putty, rope, paper, envelopes, knives, hammers, saws, squares, dripping pans, scissors, glass, whiting, pails, tacks, and other articl

UNLICENSED LIQUOR FENDORS. Satch of Them Betere the Court-Unsuccessful Subteringe - Opinions Pro and Con.

At the conclusion of the liquor licens year 1881-82 the Commissioners deci ded that they could not grant any more licenses than the law allowed; in con sequence a number of houses had to be refused liceuses. I'he keepers of them have not refrained from selling liquor, and this morning four persons -three men and one weman—were summoned before the Police Magistrate charged with having unlawfully disposed of liquor. Before the court opened each of the parties appeared and deposited \$20 and costs, hoping thereby to escape punishment, but in this they were not successful, as the payments were tantamount to pleas of "guilty."

PRETTY STIFF FINES. None of the defendants appeared when the Magistrate took the bench After their names were called he imposed a fine of \$40 and costs each, adjourning the cases until to morrow morning in order to give them an opportunity to put in a defence if they desired to do so. The Magistrate said he was not willing to accept the lowest fine in such cases. The absentees were not innoent offenders. They knew their l senses had expired; and if a fine of only \$20 were imposed from time to time the law would be broken with impunity, as many of those prosecuted would not object to pay the cost of a license, \$150. n this way. Should the parties again offend, the law as laid down in such cases, will be stringently enforced. Illicit liquor selling had to be stamped

VENTILATING THEIR GRIEVANCES. The fined liquor dealers feel very much chagrined over the turn things has taken. They are, of course, annoy ed because they did not secure licenses. but it must be remembered that the Commissioners have but one course to pursue-to comply with the law.
