RAILWAY JUNCTION

A meeting was held on Monday at Renfrew for the consideration of the subject of aiding the Kingston & Pembroke R.R., in the event of a junction being formed with that village.

The proposition submitted by Mr. Gildersleeve to a previous meeting was then read. The following accompanying estimate of the cost of the junction, as put in by Mr. Gildersleeve, and which formed the basis of the bonus of \$25,000 asked for by the Company, was also submitted.

Right of way from Malis-walks R. to near Renfrew, 1 1/2 miles for 13 miles at \$250 per mile. 3,750
Two miles near Renfrew, say 24 acres. 2,700
Extra land, 10 acres at \$200. 2,000
Passenger station. 2,000
Freight station. 2,000
Engine shed, &c. 5,000
Wood shed, &c. 500
Repair shops. 6,500
Total. \$25,000

Mr. A. A. Wright moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. P. McKee. That it is desirable that we should assist in procuring for this village the Kingston & Pembroke R.R. in this village to the utmost of our ability, and that this village should undertake to procure the right of way through this village.

Mr. McDonald said the villagers desired the junction and the benefits it conferred. Is the municipality in a position to grant the railway aid? It is to the Legislature pass an Act legalizing a bonus by law? He was of opinion that the by-law would not carry, the municipality being already \$30,000 in debt.

Mr. Wright urged the people to take advantage of the tide to their affairs—the He of the Railway Company. Was it not worth while for the village to give some aid, when the county was ready to give \$180,000 to this railway. They should try the Railway Company, as they would any other desirable customer.

Mr. Logan, Sr. spoke. He was willing to give the \$25,000, as advocated by Mr. Wright, and if the K. & P. would agree not to amalgamate with the Grand Trunk, he would be ready to give double the amount.

Mr. McDonald's resolution having been withdrawn, Mr. R. Airth moved, seconded by Mr. P. Devine, the following amendment to the amendment, which, on being put to the meeting, was lost by 16 to 24. That the Reeve convey to the President of the K. & P. Railway the deep regret that the rotapayers of this village feel at their inability, on account of debt incurred through a former railway bonus to give any direct aid to the road, and to inform them that they cheerfully exempt the Company's grounds and buildings from taxation for a period of ten years, and will use their influence with landowners along the line to get the right of way at as low a price as possible.

The Renfrew Mercury announces the Reeve has since received an answer from the President of the K. & P. R.R. Mr. Gildersleeve saying that the offer of a bonus of only \$3,000 was an appointment, and submitting a new proposition, i.e., exemption from taxation for twenty years, a bonus of \$3,000 payable on the completion of the line into Renfrew, and \$5,000 when the assessment shall have increased \$30,000 over its present amount, or one payment of \$6,000 on the completion of the line to Renfrew. The exemption and bonus will be paid for by the Legislature, but the expenses attendant thereon to be borne by the Company.

ANARCHY IN EGYPT.

London, July 21.—Port Said is reported full of refugees. A large number of persons were brought from Lemania to a German war steamer, chiefly German refugees from Cairo, Taubah, and other towns. They report that many Europeans were brutally murdered. One respectable man described a scene, in which he saw a Sofa sitting on the ground cutting the throat of a European, while others were holding the victim's head and knees. The English consul at Port Said is badly wounded, and unconscious to the use of his arms. The town is swarming with women and children. In the event of an attack by the Arabs or Belevs the loss of life would be fearful, for although the guns of the English fleet command the peninsula the Egyptian population numbers 11,000 or 13,000, including refugees. Hundreds would be killed by the guns of the British fleet, and many more by the fire of the Egyptian army.

Alexandria, July 22.—General Alison is moving with two regiments of infantry and a mounted squadron in the direction of Arabi's stronghold. The direction of Arabi's stronghold is said to be in the direction of the Suez Canal. It is supposed that the children were not on the land searched, they were not in the creek, and there was now not one more left to examine, that was the lake. A large number of men dragged the lake. "We will hang him to the nearest tree and let the law punish him afterwards." Up to a late hour the children had not been found, not a trace of them to be had.

London, July 22.—In the House of Commons the Secretary of War stated that the amount of the proposed vote of credit for the Egyptian expedition would be £3,300,000. He also asked for a supplementary vote of £100,000 men for the expedition. Several of the Opposition members declared that the Convention had been concluded with France relative to the Suez Canal.

Alexandria, July 22.—Reconnoissances are making to day in the direction of the Rameh and Mihlah. Several of the local ladies have been found at Mah-mouleh. Constantinople, July 22.—It is said that the Minister of Foreign Affairs has appointed a delegate to the Conference of Powers.

London, July 22.—It is said that the British force in Egypt will soon number 14,000 available men. The Duke of Connaught, Generals Alison and Wood will command the force. Cairo, July 22.—The anarchy in the surrounding country is increasing. The natives to day are assaulting all the foreign and Arab stations on the railways.

Pittsburg, July 22.—President Jarrett states that the Westinghouse iron mills, employing 4,100 men, have resigned a scale. Eight mills, employing 4,300 men, are running under the Cincinnati agreement. Almost all of these men belong to the Ontario 14,000 members of the Association. 10,000 eastern iron workers belong to the Association; 30,000 men are idle on account of the strike, of whom 16,000 are members of the Association. Jarrett is confident that the strikers will ultimately succeed. Several strikers who took work from the laborers and mechanics by working for lower wages have been expelled from the union.

Milwaukee, July 22.—One Willis recently bought a diseased hog. He was warned not to use the meat. He, however, fattened the animal, killed it, and with his wife and three children ate the meat. Both adults are now dying, and the child can hardly recover. The flesh of all the victims is literally alive with trichinae.
