RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION

Mr. G. Laidlaw, a well known rail way contractor, has been supplying in formation respecting the progress of construction upon the Canada Pacific RR. The contractors, Langdon, Shep pard & Co., employ 1,700 teams. 4,200 men, and the best style of plant. Grad ing has been completed 150 miles further west, and the track will be abreast of Fort Qu'Appelle on the 3rd August, miles of grading west of the track have been completed. If the Government keep the Indians fed and, happy, and there is a continuance of the present fine weather, the 500 miles will be com pleted before Christmas and engines run 50 miles beyond the Saskatchewan. Three and one-quarter miles of track are laid daily, and the telegraph line is erected up to the end of the track every night. To keep the work going at the front, rails, ties, fastenings, piles, tim ber and contractors' supplies are kept moving in a steady stream from the supply depots. About sixty five carloads or eighteen tons of these materials are used each day. The Company has at its depots rails for three hundred miles of track, and fastenings for nearly 500 miles, besides ties, piles, bridge material, lumber, telegraph poles and wire. The new line; between Winnipeg and Portage la Prairie, submerged at the opening by the overflow of the Assi niboine, will be finished next month. The remainder of the line, constructed last year, from Portage la Prairie to Flat Creek, is being finished and ballasted. and the ambankments raised and widen ed. The Syndicate have 3,400 men on their works, making a total of 7,600 in all employed on the western division. The terminal improvements and station shops at Winnipeg are necessarily on a large scale. A MONTREAL OPINION.

Effect of the Customs Regulations on the Vessel Shortages-American Stoprionle Expected.

The Montreal correspondent of the Globe telegraphs the opinion of a ship per upon the imposition of duty on ves sel shortages

"Suppose," said he, "a vessel comes much as the smaller vessel, and her bill of lading says that she has that amount on board or should have it. But the smaller vessel that carries twenty thousand bushels and has a shortage of one in a thousand goes scot free of paying a cent. Now do you see any logic in that It is in the first place wrong to charge a vessel owner customs dues on goods he does not land, quite as bad as if a package of twenty bushels entered in a miscellaneous bill of lading were detained and never shipped, but were charged as dutiable goods just the same, because they were on the bill of lading.

'How do our Customs officers act in "There never is any such thing done here. Suppose a vessel were charged twenty tons shortage here, do you sup pose she would come back for another such dose? The thing is monstrous, and why it has not been changed before

"Are they principally American vessels that are engaged in the grain trade to hingston ?"

this I am at a loss to know."

"I suppose American vessels are most numerous. I can tell you no American captain or owner wants to pay for what he does not land, and the upshot of it will be that there will be retaliatory measures taken by the American Customs officers when we commence to the barley business than American vessels, and when these vessels go to Oswego they will have to pay the piper. "What has been the practice in Ameri-

"They never charge a cent upon goods except those that are landed, no matter what the bill of lading may say. They pay no attention to any except actual treight landed. This is the correct commercul course. They are now threatening to make reprisals, however, and it behoves our Customs officers at Kingstop to be careful in their extravagant demands for shortages.
