MARINE NEWS. The tug D. Wheeler and two barges have arrived from Oswego for leached ashes. The steam barge Grimsby, from Toledo, with 22,700 bushels of wheat, has arrived.

The prop. Acadia lightened 4,000 bushels of wheat from Toledo and proceeded eastward. The schr. Gearing brought from Oswego 175 tons of coal and 675 sacks of corn meal. On the latter there is a day of 10c per sack.

The first cargo this year by way of the Midland RR. and Port Hope arrived this morning on the schr. Lewis Ross. She carried 15,948 bushels of wheat. Capt. Taylor has inspected the barges Toledo, Hawk and Finch, and re-classed them B1. They have all been docked and put in thorough repair.
