## DEFEAT OF THE LODES.

Mr. Gladstone has again shewn himself to be a "grand old man." He is impulsive at times, like most men, but be is generally deliberative in action and in pursuit of duty conscientious, firm and courageous. The Arrears of Rent Bill was not the offspring of a moment's thought. Years of observation had impressed upon his mind the necessity of such a measure in order to adjust the differences between landlord and tenant, protecting the one and redressing the grievances of the other. The events transpiring since his return to power impelled him to take a decided step in this direction, and that the legislation has been delayed until the present is due to a .variety of very obvious causes. As a telerably safe measure, reasonable in its provisions, restrictive inits application, designed to do justice to all concerned, modified to merit the support of the popular mind as voiced in the House of Commons, this bill finally left the hands of the Premier and passed under the criticism of the Lords.


