ACCIDENT ON THE CANAL. About two o'clock yesterday morning the propeller Lake Ontario had just passed through the seventh lock of the Beauharnois Canal when the steamer Prince Arthur, of the American line, ran into the lower gates of the lock before the upper ones were closed, thereby letting the whole volume of water in the six mile level pass through ancheck ed. Three of the gates are broken, and a large force of men are busy repairing the damage. Navigation will be stopped for three days. Steamers and barges are arriving from the west, but will be detained at the head until the repairs are completed. A number of farms near the foot of the Canal are flooded, and the grain swept away.

It is rumoured that the Richelieu Ontario Navigation Co. will put on a me of palace steamers next season The Prescott Telegraph very much doubts the statement, as the Company could hardly have boats built in time for next season's travel. Side wheel steamers, larger than those now in use, would be perfectly useless for take travel. What the R. & O. N. line really wants is three large screw steamers, built after the model of ocean going steamships, capable of accommodating three or four hun ired passengers. These boats could ply between Toronto and Prescott or Brock ville, leaving the trip from either of these ports to Montreal to be made by the steamers now in use. Such a line would be safer, and would afford better accommodation than the present, and would attract thousands to the St. Lawrence who now refrain from taking the trip owing to the lack of accommoda
