### HON. MR. MASSON.

By telegraph the rumour has been confirmed that Hon. L. F. A. Masson has been called to the Senate as successor of Dr. Dumanchel, of Milie Isles. He was boru in Terrebonne, in Confederation was formed in 1867 he was sent by the people among whom he had so far lived to the Commons, and by acciamation he was returned for the same constituency in 1872, 1874, and 1878. He was in France, seeking a recuperation of his health which had been impaired, when Hon. Mr. Mackenzie, having been defeated at the polls. resigned; and of so much importance was Mr. Masson, such was the desire to consult him, a leader of the French, the superior even of the re oubtable Lan gevin, that Sir John postponed the formation of the Cabinet until his return to Canada. Masson accepted the port folio of Minister of Militia, and in that capacity visited Kingston and spoke at the closing exercises in connection with the Military College three years ago. Continued ill health caused him to resign the headship of an important Department, and to accept the position of President of the Council, the daties of which are exceedingly light. This, how ever, he also resigned, and returned to France in quest of health, which he val ued more than any office. That he has been improved by the trip is indicated by his readiness to re-enter public life. He is certainly one of the foremost men of his party, a lawyer of great ability and character, and an opponent of the bulk of the jobbery in which his political friends are so much disposed to includge. He has refused to go the whole ticket on several occasions, but departed from his usual course and smirched his other wise creditable career by making a half hearted defence of Reil, at the time the Red River rebellion was under discussion in Parliament.


