### SHORTER SCHOOL HOURS.

Five hours is the usual length of New York school hours, and yet the Heraid shrieks out wildly. It avers that by some mental process, beyond the appre hension of anvone not a lunatic, the study hours of children in most public schools are longer than any mature mind could endure without hirm. The Herald is nothing if not eccentric or sen sational. The average Kingston boy and girl is a vigorous specimeu. makini his mark whether he stays at home or goes abload through his vigor of mine and body. And yet the school hours here are a trifle over five hours, with three recesses quite long enough to af ford a rest for the mind. Of course, the New York pupil may be a different subject both in physique and early training, and steadiness and application may not be within his nature. The tentency. we know even here in Kingston, is towards shorter hours of study, but is i being wisely ordered? Rather let the heavy lessons enforced on the pupil to evening study be reduced, then the simplest of humane and scientific seut: ment may step in and declare that school houses should be as bright an well ventilated as the trustees or pa rents' dwellings, or as the churches and public halls we visit for a few hours each week. The consorship of doilar and cents is doing more to weaken the mental and physical qualities of the young on five hours a day, than eight or nine hours of study would in a pure atmosphere. School houses utterly unfit for occupancy have been tolerated because a City Council which knows far less about schools than it does of street management, has locked up the funds. The School Board is, however, doing the best it can in the way of temporary amelioration, its midsummer repairs usually taking the form of some rational improvement. This year the scandalous crowding of little children in Queen Street School has been done away with.

But the mighty dollar rules and reform advances slowly against it. Meanwhile don't let us put any undas weight upon that nightmare, the slavery of school bours.


