### BOILER EXPLOSION.

A Wreck at Chatham - Engineer Killed-Narrow Escapes.

Chatham, Out., Oct. 13 .- The boiler of the Ontario Flour Mills exploded about seven o'clock this morning, totally destreying the engine house and badly shattering the main building. Pieces of brick and large fragments of the wood work were projected to agreat distance The bricks surrounding the boiler were hurled in all directions of the neighbourhood. The engineer, James B. H. Rothwell, McDonald, was found underneath a pile of debris so badly injured that he only lived a few hours. There were several miraculous escapes. Mr. Ferguson, dry goods merchant, who was crossing the ankle from a flying brick. The damage to the mill and machinery is \$12,000. Cause of the explosion unknown.

----The Lost Asia.

Owen Sound, Oct. 12. -- The body of Mrs. Woods, of Cincinatti, has been found concealed on Lonely Island, stripped of her jewellery and valuables. The light house keeper found the body seven days before the search party discovered it, but did not report the fact. The inquest, held at the instance of the Ontario Government, has been concluded.
