BILL FOR TRANSFERRING THE LAN CANTERIAN SONOUL BOARD PRO-PERTI TO THE PUBLIC SCHOOL.

Last evening a joint meeting of the old Midland District School Boards occurred in the rooms of the Board of Education. There were present Mesers, S. H. Fee, W. Irving. N. C. Polson, G. Waldron, S. Anglin, Inspector Kidd, Rev. F. W. Kirkpatrick, Rev. Henry Wilson, A. Thibodo, W. out and closes the play. The first act Ford, J. M. Machar, R. M. Rose, M.

Dr Fee moved that Mr. A. Thibodo take the chair, and Mr. Polson second ed the motion. There was objection from the members of the Lancasterian Board. Mr. Polson said that he simply seconded the motion as a compliment to the Lancasterian Board. BILL FOR TRANSFERRING THE ASSETS. The bill as proposed was read by Mr M. Machar. The preamble plain! Society should be handed over to the Public School Board. The operative clauses are to the following effect

1. All the assets and estate, real and personal, powers and franchises of the said Midland District School Society are standing room for all who want to hear hereby absolutely vested in the said The Public School Board of the City of Kingston' as well for the purposes set forth in the preamble to the Act of In corporation of the said Midland District School Society, passed in the 55th year of King George III. and chaptered 18, as for the purposes of establishing and maintaining at Kingston aforesaid an Industrial School or Schools under the provisions of the Industrial Schools Act. provided, however, that the income only which shall be derived from the said assets and estate or from any other estate into which the same shall be converted, shall be expended and sp plied for the said purposes or any of them, and that the principal of said estate shall be maintained intact.

said Act or in any other Act contained the said assets and estate shall be held managed, administered and disposed of and the said powers and franchises shall be exercised and enjoyed by the said the Public School Board of the City of Kingston, exclusively for the purposes aforesaid under and in accordance with the provisions of the Industrial School's Act, and of the Public Schools Act, and for every other Act applicable to said Public School Board, and they are here by expressly authorized to kold the real estate, hereby vested in them, and te acquire and hold any other real estate for the purposes aforesaid, exclusive o and in addition to the real estate which they are now authorized to held.
