DEDICATORY SERVICES.

Opening of the Methodist Church, Cataraqui- & Mana, sme Edifice-Arrange ments for fo Morrow.

To morrow the dedicatory services in connection with the new Methodist Church, Cataraqui, occurs. For years the congregation worshipped in an old church in the village, but last spring Rev. Mr. Huxtable conceived the idea of erecting such a building as the village sufficient sum to warrant the work being undertaken. Plans were prepared by Power & Son, and in June, 1881, the building was commenced. J. G. Walker, of Cutaraqui, took the contract for the whole work but sublet some portions of

it. The edifice has been completed for some months, but the dedication was postponed in consequence of the ill health of the pastor, Rev. D. Councily. His death changed the programme and his funeral sermon was the first delivered in the new church. The building stands on an eminence

and overlooks the village. It is gothic in style, is bailt of red brick with white trimmings. Its size is 47 x 87 ft., contains four small windows on each side a large one in the gable and two small ones and a circular light of stained glass in the front. On the roof a bell tower has been erected. On entering the building through a porch, 94 x 7 ft. one is impressed with the cosy appear ance of everything. The auditorium is pulpit, and the seats, arranged in amphitheatre style (ash and pine, oiled and varnished are on the incline, raised slightly one above another.

The platform is reached by two stops, pieces of furniture. The seating will make good the alleged deficiencies in accommodate about 450 persons.
