ALCOHOL FROM CORDWOOD. It begins to look as though a man may yet obtain his whiskey direct from his own wood pile, that is if he allows to pass through the Mathieu retorts first. Beside the charcoal it is claimed that about three gallons of alcohol may also he obtained from a cord of wood, beside valuable chemical compounds. The vapor from the wood is conducted through an iron pipe into a large condenser. The vapor is condensed, the gas separated and it passes back under the retorts to and the flames for heating the wood. The condensed vapor at this stage resembles crude petroleum in appearance, but it is more pungent to the taste This liquid passes into large storage tanks, thence to a still similar in con struction and operation to the stills for the production of alcohol, heated by coils of steam pipes. The alcohol drawn off and passes on to the "alcoho

works" where it is further "treated." NOT FIT FOR THEATING PURPOSES. Wood alcohel does not possess th same tempting qualities as "corn juice" or "old rye" products. It is methyl alcohol, undrinkable and possesses the qualities of making ordinary alcohol undrinkable when one tenth or one twentieth part is mixed with it. It is now barrelled up and ready to be shipped. This preparation may afterwards be manufactured inte pure acetic acid, but in its present form is largely used in dye works, as mordaunt in fixed colours in calico printing. The demand for that comes from Engand where it is asually worth about £12 per ton. About 200 pounds of this substance can be obtained from each shown with pleasure.

THE MARKET FOR PRODUCE. The great question is whether a sufficient market can be obtained for the products. Of the chances of sales for the alcohol, acetic acid and wood there can be little doubt. It is yet to be seen whether some thousands of bushels of charcoal can be profitably disposed of each day. Mr. S. Mills had been some time trying to get an iron smelting furnace established at Kingston, but found CHEAP, CHEAP that the dearness of coal was too great a parrier. He entered heartily into the project of these works, hoping to remove the difficulty. No actual steps have yet been taken toward the smelting works. and the signs are not propitions. Meanwhile other markets have to be sought. Charcoal is becoming more popular for cooking purposes, especially in ranges. 50c each because of the absence of smoke. For the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, about eight thousand bushels are used each year for broiling, and other large hotels are also using great quantities.

There are now employed about the works 16 men, but when all get in good ranning order, probably not over onehalf that number may be needed. It is estimated that three or four thousand cords of wood will be required each year. The works have only been in running order for a few weeks, and all is not yet running smoothly. Should they prove as successful as is anticipated, the Kingston Charcoal Company will beentitled to great credit for their enterprise.
