> Yesterday morning when the students of the R val Medical College adopted their ultimatum, and demanded a plain "yes" or "no," it looked very much as if a disastrous end had been almost reached in the College difficulty. There was one day left ere the young men would disperse to their homes for the Christmas bolidays, many of them so incensed as likely to be resolute in their determination not to return here. The time for an amelieration of feeling was so short that there was little prespect of either interest giving away sufficient ly to effect a pleasant result without mediatorial offer of some sort. It was in this emergency that the four gentle men mentioned yesterday, Ex-Mayors Gildersloove, McIntyre, and Pense, with Mayor Gaskin, offered their services the hope of preserving unimpaired institution of such local pride and influence. In the afternoon they interview ed Professors and students in the hope of getting hold of some thread through which to unravel the difficulty, but for a time quite hopelessly. It was appareut that the Faculty desired an early peace, but they felt that they had gone as far as they heneurably could. They declared that an

ILLEGAL AND UNMANLY EXPULSION of the lady students was the only thing open in order to meet the demands of the students and they felt decidedly that they could not consent to this, even the school upon which so much their labour had been centred had to suffer a serious breach.
