BENEATH THE CAR WHEELS.

The Fatal Injuries Received by Henry Covle the Cabman-A Terribly Sad Accident.

We were able to give last evening only a short account of one of tho catastrophes that agitate a community It occurred at the Grand Trunk Depot At noon yesterday Henry Coyle was happy and full of life. When accosted by a member of our staff, he pleas antly replied "Good-day," but before even tide had come realized the great unce tainties of life. The accident by whie poor Harry -as he was familiarly cal ed-met his death, is a terrible one to contemplate. About 3:30 o'clock. accompanied by his youngest son, he drove to the station, and being some at early he and others crossed to the sting room , where they found comfort cound a glowing coal fire. The train was late, and when the whistle indi tting its approach was heard a rush the cab stand was made to be there and in writing when the train arrived in accordance with the regulations for the government of the cabmen while the company's premises. Mr. Coyle was one of the last to leave the restau rant and cross the track between the two platforms. He evidently miscalcu ated the speed of the train, and did not know it was so near at hand. His right leg was crushed below the kuce and hang by lacerated flesh. It was taken off and the wound bound up. The left leg was similarly affected and crushed. The car wheels had passed over it in a stanting direction, commence ing about two inches above the knee. then passing down and involving the knue cap and joint. The log had to be computated at the lower third of the thigh. Before the operation Coyle show al signs of conscionaness, but never spoke. He was then placed under the aflyence of ahloroform and the operation performed. He never rullied from the shock of the accident. His family sobbing as only the heart broken canwere with him antil death relieved him of pain. He said but a few words after the awful crush. He looked, when first picked up, daze I and dreamy, then the situation seemed to be comprehended by him for a moment, as he thought of his fate, his home and family, be mutter-

ed despuringly, "Oh, this is torrible! CHERDING THE DANGER. Another spectator of the accident says that Mr. Coyle was thrown by the engine against the platform, that he hen rolled oil, and that his legs being caught under the car wheels he was dragged along the track for quite a dis tance. The tatality demonstrates the necessity for an exercise of great cantion by persons who have to await the arrival of the trains. On previous occasions warnings have been given that accidents would occur, and even hair breatu escapes have taken place, yethese have had no effect and the cab men and others have risked their lives by running in front of the trains. The practice should cease now altogether. It would be desirable were the Company to provide quarters for the cabstand where the men could warm and save themselves from danger. We make the suggestion and hope that the Company will see fit to carry it out.

Mr. Covie leaves a wife, four sons and a daughter, whose relations have been of a most harmonious nature. eldest son, James, foreman of the News, has been for some weeks confined to the house, very iti, and his condition has been made worse by the shock of the tearful accident which deprives him of his father and best friend
