FIRE IN CONSECON.

Yesterday morning the most disas-

trous fire that ever befell Consecon took

place. About two o'clock fire was dis-

covered issuing from the store of John

Byers, general merchant. The building

ings, owned and occupied by John G.

Zierman, grocer, were in flames. The

wind being high at the time the build-

ings across the street were soon subject

to the fiery element. People worked

with a will, but there being no fire ap-

pliance at the mercy of the flames. The names

of the losers are as follows: John By-

ers, general merchant, everything saved;

John Hicks, harness maker, everything saved;

Jacques Coyle, loss about \$1,000, insured

for \$750; several tenement houses be-

longing to Greenfields &amp; Co., Mon-

treal, insurance not known; and John

Middleton, loss about \$1,000, insured.
