Allan Fraser has sold his farm of one hundred acres in Fredericksburg, to B. Hunt, for \$6,000.

Wm. Boyd, who escaped from Chief Habbitt, Pictor, has settled the case at Napanee for which he was arrested, paying \$300 and all costs.

George Lett, of Richmond, commenced seed last Thursday, and a farmer near Bath has put one hundred bushels in the ground already.

Davidson of John Murphy, Tamworth, 13 yrs., was taken suddenly ill last Sunday and died the next morning. He had been in good health all along till then. He and another lad were playing at "boating" in a boat of water.

A hotel is to be built at the t. T. Park as soon as practicable. A restaurant where meals may be procured at reasonable hours, and luncheons provided for fishing parties, will be erected during the season.

The youngest daughter of Chas. Port Melville, near Concession, stepped into a pan of hot maple syrup sitting in the woodshed. Her lower extremities were terribly scalded. She lived but eight days after the accident.

H. H. Warner, of Rochester, subscribed \$100 for the re-stocking of the St. Lawrence with black bass, conditioned upon the raising of \$300 for that purpose.

Wm. Lewis, teacher in the Clancy neighbourhood, Camden, died very suddenly on Thursday. He was fishing on Salmon river, and took cold, which soon turned to inflammation of the bowels. During the night he asked for a drink, which he refused to take, when he suddenly fell back and expired. He was a young man about twenty-two years of age.
