Twenty-five cars of sugar were shipped from Halifax yesterday, over the Intercolonial, to Kingston, Toronto and Hamilton.

A roll of cloth, bought at Walsh & Steacy's store, still lies unclaimed at the Post office.

The Post Office Department has advertised tenders for carrying a mail every Saturday, between Gananoque and Sealey's Bay.

The Intelligence urges the capitalists of Belleville to start iron ship building before "Kingston or some other enterprising place" gets ahead of it.

At a recent session of the Perth Teachers' Association a Stratford exchange says Mr. S. Woods gave a splendid address on Canadian History.

Mr. R. Cornett, who represents the Kingston district for the firm of A. Hodgson & Co., has purchased and shipped, during the past week, over 1,700 cheeses, valued at \$10,000.

Rev. J. F. Porter in England.

The Rev. J. F. Porter, of Irtfield Road Church, North Bow, London, Eng., (quite recently of the P. M. Church, Kingston), is winning much favor in the Metropolis for force and ability.

HER DISPLAY OF EKROTIS.

As she entered the room she haughtily glanced around, and then not apparently recognizing any one she became nervous, visibly agitated, and attempted to stifle her emotion.

She failed to conceal her feeling, however, and raising her hands to her eyes she buried her face in an elegant silk handkerchief, and burst into tears.

Presently she recovered, and the magistrate charged her with drunkenness and disorderly conduct. In a sweet and affecting voice she replied: "It isn't so." P. C. Snodden took the stand and gave his testimony. She was found on Earl street, he said, dressed in a gray coat and pants, white vest, and walking along with a drunken citizen. Both were intoxicated, the girl especially so. She was swearing in a very loud manner. Pidgeon was apparently chiding her, as she told him what she had done for him. Her arrest was made shortly before 1 a.m.

ANOTHER FOREST OF TREES.

Following this recital, and amidst her sobs Miss Pearl Reed said that she "didn't see how man could stand there and tell such stuff."

The Magistrate asked her, "Have you anything to say?"

She answered, "You wouldn't believe me after what that man has said."

Tears now streamed down her cheeks. Altogether the scene was very interesting, and not a few of those present had choking sensations.

The Magistrate, under the Act recently passed, sentenced her to one year and eleven months' confinement in the Andrew Mercer Reformatory. She was led from Court sobbing hysterically.

SKETCH OF HER GIDDY CAREER.

After her return to the cells she carried on at a great rate, avowing that her agony of soul would be the death of her. When she became quiet she was asked to give her statement of the case. She said that her parents live in Rochester, and are well to do. Some time ago she thought she would come to Canada, to Kingston especially. On Sunday morning she arrived on the str. "Magnet" and put up at a hotel. Shortly afterwards she fell in with the man and he had been her consort until arrested. Last evening she was at the drill shed, and after the parade was treated liberally. After a time she was seized by one of the two fellows in her company, and held while the other took off her clothing and put a suit belonging to him upon her. She was then forced to go up a walk, and while on the street was arrested. She pleaded hard to be released, and wanted a telegram sent to her brother in law named Snyder in Ithaca.

Pearl Reed is a brunette, with a remarkably pretty face, but she is evidently a giddy girl. She is only 18 years of age, and says she was never in goal before.

ARREST OF YOUNG COULTER.

This morning Coulter was arrested for passing liquor through the grating of the cell, from the outside, to the girl Reed. He was fined \$2 for the offence.

Resting.

The system of preserving fodder in its green state throughout the year, which has met with so much success in the United States, is about being tried upon the farm of Mr. Alfred Brown in Pittsburg. A vault has been constructed underground with air-tight stone walls, 20 x 12 feet, and 8 feet in depth. If this experiment is successful it is the intention of Mr. Brown to erect another, similar in size next year. The vault will hold 60 tons of fodder.
