GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY. Kingston & Pembroke Express. This morning Mr. Wm. Waggoner, of the "Wagoner House," Ontario street, dropped dead in the house of Mr. J. F. McDermott, the result undoubtedly of heart disease. Mr. Waggoner was well developed man with ruddy face and the hair would be taken as a sufferer from that ailment. This morning he arose quite early and complained of severe pains in the region of the heart. After breakfast he visited Dr. Sullivan to be examined and if possible obtain relief. The doctor was waiting on Mr. McDermott, who was so engrossed in the case as to find it impossible to wait on Mr. Waggoner for a time. The doctor had run around by his office to prepare some medicine, when Mr. Waggoner entered the place and stated his case to the doctor. After some consultation he decided to return at 6 p.m. and have a diagnosis of his condition made. He said he had been suffering from pains in his breast for about a year. When Dr. Sullivan started for Mr. McDermott's Mr. Waggoner accompanied him. They had only went a short distance when Mr. Waggoner said the pains were coming on again and that he could go no further. The doctor looked around for a cab. Mr. Waggoner said he could walk home, but reaching McDermott's steps, upon Dr. Sullivan sat down. The doctor assisted him inside and had him comfortably placed in a chair when he threw up his hands, gasped several times, and expired. His body was afterwards removed to his late home. Mr. Waggoner was only 42 years of age and was known to most people in the city. He was a son of the late Col. Waggoner, and spent his youth and early manhood on the Wagoner Homestead in Glenoraire, in which section he has a great many relatives still residing. Some ten or twelve years ago he returned to this city. He was in turn proprietor of the Albion Hotel (now the Windsor) and afterwards the "Wagoner House," Ontario street. He leaves a wife and several children, who will receive much sympathy in their affliction.

Reductions to Assessment. The Court of Revision having completed their work of revising the assessment of 1902, a reporter of this paper had an inspection of the books and made the following computation of the reductions in each Ward: Rideau \$ 6,875 St. Lawrence 18,194 Ontario 24,718 Victoria 2,800 Frontenac 2,340 Sydneyham 12,000 Cataraqui 7,100 \$75,024. Besides these reductions there were allowances of one third of the taxes on account of vacancy. For such reductions about \$550 might be added, but against this there were several additions which would probably reduce the revisions to \$75,000. The assessment totalled for 1902, \$5,794,631. The present assessment will be about \$5,719,631. This is \$214,087 more than the assessment of 1901, before the Court of Revision had done its work and shows that the city is progressing.
