The Mercer Will Case. Mrs. Andrew Mercer, or as she is termed in law Mrs. Bridget O'Reitly, died vesterday morning at Toronto, after illness of about three weeks. The deceased was the principal figure in the Mercer estate trial, which excited general interest when before the superior courts here a couple of years ago, Mr. Mercer died possessed of a large fortune, and Mrs. O'Reilly, who had lived with him for a number of years, set up a claim to the estate, declaring that the was Mr. Mercer's wife, that the marriage had been performed privately, and a son, now a young man of twenty-three or twentyfour, was the offspring of that marriage. The case was taken to the Court of Chancery, and after a searching examination the Court decided that Mr. Mercer had no heirs. The estate was then given into the hands of the Ontario Government who decided to erect a female reformatory with the moneys. Young Mercer received about \$25,000 out of the estate. Mrs. O'Reilly and her son continued in possession of Mercer homestead at the corner of Bayes and Wellington streets. Notice to quit was served upon them by and decaying. The very air seemed full the Attorney-Genaral, but under legal advice they kept possession, believing that the son's right to the property could be established. The case was argued recently before the Chancellor, and, as announced in yesterday's paper, he gave his decision that the Ontario Government had a right to escheat.
