Notwithstanding the secrecy, to a certain extent observed by the delegates as to the nature of their precise demands, it is believed after careful enquiry from a number of sources, that the following is a fair representation of the amount of protection which they desire on a few leading industries, With a tew exceptions a general rise to 35 per cent. is requested on the 174 per cent. list; from 5 to 15 or 20 per cent. is to be imposed on ropes and cordage; on leather, 35 per cent. at the least; on silk, 30 per cent.; on furniture, 25 to 30 per cent; boots, shoes and saddlery, 35 per cent; on agricultural implements, 25 per cent.; on other machinery, 35 per cent.; on wool lens, 50 to 75 per cent; on wool, 25 to per cent.; on flannels and blankets, 50 to 75 per cent. It is stated that in its general policy the Government endeavour to tax such articles heavily as are imported extensively from the United States, and favour those imported from England to a large extent. This course is merely to prevent the English manufacturers from becoming slarmed. Coal is to be removed from the free list, and subjected to a duty of 174 per cent. with a slight discrimination in favour of hard coal as a boon to Outario. There is still doubt as to the pig iron question, and on this point the Manufecturers' associations are still in difficulty. A compromise between the iron manufacturers and the users of iron has been brought about by the Associations, but it is an unwilling compromise on the part of the users of iron, for they scarcely fell that in the trifling protection afforded them they have an equivalent to the several dollars per ton imposed on pig iron. Indian corn is to be taxed at ten per sent.; flour and wheat at from fifteen to Maritime Province Ministers are adverse, naturally, to a heavy duty; but the Cotario members are vigorously pushing the claims of the producers.
