HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES.

SOME OF KINGSTON'S MOST USEFUL INSTI TUTIONS.

> "The practical working of the 'Charity Aid Act has brought to light a few rath er serious defects in the provisions of this otherwise excellent statute. It is claimed by the managers of some of the charities that, having regard to be nature of the work performed, the Provincial aid is not equitably distributed, and after six years' observation and experience. I am inclined to believe that the complaint is well founded. The statute provides that Hospitals shall receive thirty cents per day for the stay of each patient in those Institutions; that refuges seven cents per day for each adult inmate; and that orphana es shall rece. ve two cents per day for each youth lodged and maintained in them. Holding, as I do, in the highest estimation the excellent service being performed by the Hospitals and the eficiency with which it is generally done, I do not think that the rate of Government aid to these Institutions is more than they are entitled to, particularly when it is considered that since the pas sage of the Uharity Aid Act' uca ly every Hospital has been added to, or reconstructed, at very great expense, in order to overcome structural defects, or to provide additional accommodation to meet the increased demand for Hospital treatment. It cannot be de-

nied, however, that the difference between the per diem allowance to Hospi tals and Orphanages is entirely too great The importance of the work performed by the last-named Institutions can hard ly be over stated. But for the tempor ary refuge provided for the 2500 homeless and destitute children, who were carad for in these Orphanages during the past year, a very large proportion o them would, before long, drift into pau perism and crime, and ultimately become life burden upon the public in some form or another. Holding these views, must repeat the remarks made in a previous Report, that, if for no higher motive than public economy, it is most desirable and expedient that the hands of those who are engaged in this good work should be strengthened, and their efforts encouraged by Government aid, even to sumed by Dot, was about as good as the a much greater amount than is at present allowed.

Speaking of the hospitals the Inspector shows that 4,372 patients were treated in the various hospitals during the year, while the discharges were 3,659. The death rate increased from 261 to 279. the Kingston General Hospital during the twelve months 477 patients received treat ment, these remaining in the institution 17,766 days collectively, or an average of 37 days each. In the Hotel Dieu there were 346 patients, who were in the hos pital 9,605 days collectively or 411 days each. While the average period (for al the h spitals) cannot be looked upon as excessive for the treatment of the more serious ailments and accidents an ex aminacion of the tabulated list of diseases shews that a large proportion of the complaints were not of a serious nature, and the Inspector thinks the average period of hospital residence might be still fur-

ther reduced. FINANCES CONSIDERED. The financial condition of the institu tion is an important feature. During the past fiscal year the Kingston General Hospital received \$40 of a municipal grant for patients' maintenance; \$699.14 were received from the patients for board; \$8,777.04 in the shape of sub scriptions and donations, making a total of \$9,516 18. The Hotel Dieu at the same time was paid \$54.94 for board ; received \$486.55 as the proceeds from in donations, a total of \$2,442.73. The follows: To Kingston General Hospital, the fixed allowance of 20c per day for pain. \$3,553.20; the supplemental allowance of 20 cents per day, \$1.776.60; total statutory allowance, \$5,329 80; less for incurable patients, \$577.07. The fixed allowance for the Hotel Dieu was \$1,921 the supplemental grant, \$610.68; total statutory allowance, \$2.531 68; less for incurable patients, \$379 50.
