#### PUBLIC SCHOOL PENSIONERS.

We are decidedly in favor of

mendment in the school law which prooses that teachers who have spent the prime of their days in the profession shall be eligible to the pensional allowance at some given age-say 55 or 60 years-even if they should not then be infirm enough to obtain a medical certificate not to teach any longer. Of course this is only on the understanding that they have been bona fide teachers during the specified time, and have duly paid in their annual contributions to the Superannuation Fund. The salaries of public school teachers, as a rule, may be suf, ficient for the defrayal of current expenses of existence, but provision from such a source against the necessities of the proverbially 'rainy day,' is out of the question in the case of those who devote themselves to teaching as a life-long vocation, especially if they have domestic claims upon their slender revenue. It is unfair to ask teachers to contribute out of limited, and very often stinted, incomes, the tax per capita to this fund, and then cheat them out of any return from years of investment should they chance to be blessed with a hale old age. After a certain age-fimit has been reached in this arduous profession, it is only fair that the superannuation refund should begin, and we hope soon to see a provision in our school law which will mete out this piece of simple justice to aged teachers.

### The Municipal Act.


