After recess, the Bills respecting the Reformatory for Females and the In dustrial Refuge for Girls were passed through Committee, and the remainder of the evening was taken up with the consideration of the Bill to amend the Jurors Act. The second reading was moved by Mr. Hardy, who at great length explained its essential features. Under the present system the assessment qualification of jurors varies very much in different countries, the average being in some as high as \$600, and in others as low as from \$100 to \$200. The Bill proposes to fix the qualification at \$600 for cities, and at \$400 for towns, villages and townships. At present Magistrates are disqualified from acting as jurors at Assizes as well as Courts of Session; the Bill proposes to remove the disqualification in the case of Assize Courts. It proposes also to change materially the mode of selection, while retaining two selecting minutes it will cure any case of piles that it is possible to cure. Six or eight applications is Jury is retained as a part of the system. the number of jurors is reduced from 24 to 14, and the number necessary to the finding of a Bill is reduced from 12 to 7. As it is doubtful, pending the decision of the Supreme Court on the question, whether the Provincial Lagislature can alter the constitution of the Grand Jury or not, it is proposed to leave the whole Bill to come in force only on the proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor, which will of course be issued whenever the constitutional point is settled. CIRCUMSTANTIAL ETIDENCE, 7 HOW A NEGRO UNDER SENTENCE OF DEATH PROVED AN ALIBL.

Columbus. Ga., Feb. 25 .- In the jail of this county, under sentence of death for murder, lies a negro with a strange history. In November, 1876, a man named Holmes was murdered in the most foul and wanton manner. This negro, Sam Hall, was arrested on charge of being the murderer, and after a long trial, was convicted and sentenced. The circumstar. tial evidence was strong against him, and the sheriff of Muscoges swore, to the best of his belief, to the identity of the negro. He was sentenced to be hung. He now states that in 1872 he was sentenced to the penitentiary for fifteen years for horse stealing. He effected his escape February, 1877, and was consequently in

jail in November, 1876, when the murder was committed. This story has been substantiated in the most complete manner, and the innocence of the negro of the crime of murder is clearly proved. The negro says that when he was arrested on the charge of murder, he felt, as he knew himself innocent, that he could not be convicted. He therefore declined to acknowledge himself an escaped convict until he found that his life depended on it. He will, of course, be carried back to jail to serve out his sentence for horse stealing. Had he not been in jail at the time of the murder, he would have been hung for a

Scandalous Jobbery.

crime that he did not commit.

A scandalous piece of jobbery has come to light, and no doubt will be the subject of investigation. In 1872, when the Hon. Peter Mitchell was Minister of Marine, a bosom friend of his, one W. R. Clarke, a Boston Yankce, was appointed to prepare evidence on behalf of Canada, to be presented to the Fishery Commission at Halifax. For this work Hon. Peter Mitchell's friend received several thousand dellars in 1872, although the matter he prepared was so worthless that Sir A. J. Smith, when Minister of Marine, had to reject it altogether. During the terms of office of the late Minister of Marine no further claims for services were made by Mr. Clark, and indeed no such claim was known to be in existence. Before the change of Government all claims and accounts in connection with the Commission were settled and paid in full, but since the present Government came into power, and in the month of December last, an Order in Council was passed paying Mr. Clark \$10,000 for alleged services rendered to the Canadian Government in connection with the Halifax Fishery Commission. Sir A. J. Smith is determined to sift this scandal to the bottom, and has moved for copies of all correspondence, letters,

In the following significant facts, lately submitted by the Clerk of the Circuit ourt of Edwards county, Illinois, the economy of temperance is strikingly il-

There has not been a licensed saloon in his county for over twenty-five years. During that time our jail has not average ed an occupant. This county never sent but one person to the penitentiary, and that man was sent up for killing his wife while drunk, on whiskey obtained from a licensed saloon in an adjoining county. We have but a very few paupers in our poor house, sometimes only three or four. Our taxes are 32 per cent. lower than they are in adjoining counties where saloons are licensed. Our people are prosperous, peaceable and sober, there being very little drinking, except near Grayville, a licensed town of White county, near our border. The different teras of our Circuit Court occupy three or four days each year and then the dockets are cleared. Our people are so well satisfied with the present state of things that a very large majority of them would bitter-
