

NEWS OF THE DAY.

Princess Christine, daughter of the Duke de Montpensier, is seriously ill at Seville.

The Grand Jury have found true bills against Dr. Bowes and Geo. McCabe for the murder of Ann McCabe, of West Oxford.

Gen. Tyler yesterday defeated 3,000 of the enemy near Fushok. The enemy lost 200. The British loss is trifling. The Bengal Lancers made a brilliant charge.

The New York Times says a gentleman from New Orleans reports that the planters are panic stricken on account of the loss of laborers owing to the negro exodus.

A letter from Angiers in the *Globe* says the duty on oats and corn has decided lumber men there to reduce wages, and the notice of reduction has already been given to take effect on April 1st.

In the Talmage trial, Talmage's answer was read again all the charges, and after some discussion the Presbytery adjourned till to-day.

The *Globe's* announcement that the Ontario elections will be settled in June, affords ample time for both parties to complete their preparations. The *Mail* issued the first instalment of its cam-paign sheet to-day.

In the Rhode Island House of Representatives on the question of woman's suffrage the vote stood 25 to 13—not the two-thirds necessary for submitting an amendment of the constitution to the people.
