The Icelandic Settlers. A petition has been received by the liovernment from over one hundred of the Icelandic settlers at Gimli, on the out that the results of their labours have not leen so satisfactory as was anticipated by them, and asked that such of the colonists as desire to remove to better quarters may be allowed to do so on mak ing equitable arrangements for the payment of their respective shares of the 880,000 loaned the colony on its arrival. The petition sets forth that many of the settlers were peor on their arrival, and even with the assistance rendered them were unable to secure the necessary farm implements for successful farming, in addition to which the reserve is said to be low lying and swampy in places, therefore unfit for cultivation until properly drain ed, which they find it difficult to do. In 1877 seeds and provisions were supplied to some of the settlers and mortgages taken upon their lots for payment of the value of the same. Last year some of these parties desired to move of but missory note to the agent for the amount due the Government, which the settlers deem is not right. The petitioners state that they desire time and opportunity in order to discharge their indebtedness. They pray for the appointment by the Government of a committee of ave to value the improvements made on the land, the same to apply on account, and where the improvement does not equal the dabt, then the party to give a note for the balance before being allowed to move off to some other locality with their stock and effects.
