The Directors will thereby be enabled to set aside funds sufficient not only to meet all ascertained losses, and to provide for any that may occur in connection with current loans, but also to create an adequate A statement of the position of the bank at the end of the financial year (10th of May) will be transmitted to the shareholders before the annual meeting. Great Emigration From Europe -Oil Producers' Combination-Demand for Money Certifi-

New Pork, April 29.-The steamship City of Richmond, which arrived from appointed. Laverpool yesterday, landed 758 emigrants. This is the largest number arriving by any s'eamer since 1867, excepting on the steamer Wirland, from Hamburg, on June 5th of last year, when 899 arrived. It is anticipated that there will be a very large increase in the immigration to the United States this year. The emigrant agencies having branches in Norway and Sweden report that unusually great preparations are being made in this direction. There is also a large incoming of emigrants from Ireland and England, where thousands of mill operratives declare that, being unable to make a living, they must emigrate. Large companies are forming in southern Germany, where much distress prevails; and thousands of Russian Mennonites are expected to immigrate to the United States during the year. Owing to the fact that a Russian edict has been promule gated which compels them to do military duty after 1880, emigration has begun at an unusually early date, and it is anticipated that there will be a total of at least 100,000 before the 1st of January
