A WITTY FRENCHMAN. Old Mayor

Quincy, of Boston, U.S., was the officer

deputed to extend the civilities of that city to General Lafavette in 1824 He tells the following anecdote of the General: The cortege had stopped in Tremont street near the Commons, to allow the Frenchmen to shake hands with the General. Many greeted him and for everyone he had a kind word. One old man grasped his hand and told him that he was the father of a dozen living children.
