Fraudulent insolvencies will now be legalized for another year at any rate, for it is a tact that while the law, as it stands, affords much needed relief to bonest but untertunate traders, its provisions have been taken advantage of by dishonest sharpers for the successful perpetration of the most bare-faced fraud It was to stem this tide of commercia immorality that Mr. Colby's Act to amend the Insolvency laws was introduced. The same proper motive also influenced the rasher action of the majority in adopting the absolute repeal of all the Insolvent laws upon the statute books. But the miscarriage of the latter in the Senate has proved that it would have been viser to have accepted the half-loaf of amendment than to have grasped at entire abolition. 


