DOMINION AND PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS.

It is rather a curious circumstance that while the House of Commons is largely Conservative, and while as a consequence the Dominion Tory Cabinet is almost omnipotently strong there, the two principal provinces of the Dominion should be under the regime of Liberal Government.

A little over a year ago the Provincial elections of Quebec and Ontario were held. Between these the Dominion elections occurred. Yet the provincial elections sustained Liberal Governments, while in these same Provinces the vote for the Dominion House was preponderantly Tory.

London, June 11.—All European Sovereigns have sent messages of congratulation to Emperor William on the occasion of his golden wedding, and over 10,000 letters have been received from other distinguished persons. The Emperor has signed a limited amnesty list.

London, June 11.—A despatch from Berlin at 10 o'clock p.m. says the weather has been cloudy all day, but no rain has fallen. The Imperial nuptial ceremonies passed off without any special incident.

London, June 11.—Reports received here state that the Irish anti-rent movement is increasing. New York, June 11.—Aldermen's Committee to arbitrate between longshoremen and steamship companies have reported that the latter would not let them arbitrate, and the Aldermen in revenge propose proceedings against the companies for obstructing the streets.
