> (Per Dominion Line.) New York, June 11.-About seven o'clock this morning Mrs. Jane De Fores! Hull, a married woman, aged fifty years, and proprietress of a fashionable boarding house, No. 140 West 42ud street, was found by one of her servants lying dead in her room.
