Hanlan's Crowning Triumph.

EASY DEFEAT OF ELLIOTT.

A LEAD OF FIVE LENGTHS.

Thousands see the Race.

GREAT DAY FOR CANADA.

Newcastle-on-Tyne, June 16.—Both men did excellent work yesterday, Hanlan pulling from Scottowood to Elwick and back, about 4 miles, and Elliott from Dunton to Skinnerburn, and back to Scottowood. The twelve-oared cutter of each man attended him. They had a race of over a mile on the way home, and Hanlan's cutter showed best in the tussle, which created great enthusiasm in the crowd, which numbered near 30,000. Everything is right this morning.

Newcastle-on-Tyne, June 16, 11 a.m.—The city is thronged with humanity. It is one great bee-hive. The crowd is numerous beyond all calculation. Some modestly claim that there are 10,000 people in the city. However this be, it is admitted that beyond doubt twice as many people are now in the city as ever before attended any boat on the Tyne. I took a run down the Thames, and saw a boat with a crew of twelve, and every oar and rudder had its occupant, who were evidently prepared to make a night of it. Not much work is doing yet in the colliery districts, and it seems as if none of the people are now weighing the steamers down to the water's edge. The docks, shipyards, bridges and meadows are covered with a pall of human beings. Excursion trains are pouring out heads of iron, and the river is so packed with them that it seems as if every inch of the water would soon be impassable. He is lying down, and seems to be full of determination and fire. Elliott's door was opened at about 11.45 a.m., and he had just taken a short rest when a man in a boat came up to him and said that he had just seen the other boat on the water.

Newcastle-on-Tyne, June 16, noon.—Both men were on hand at 11.45 a.m. The start was made over the Tyneside after a few minutes delay. Hanlan was leading when two hundred yards and was never headed while in sight. Another account. Thousands of spectators were present; the scene was an extraordinary one. The water was smooth, with a slow ebb tide, and the wind which favored fast time. A good start was made, Hanlan immediately taking a slight lead. Hanlan led by half a length for the first 50 and 100 yards, Elliott pulling a mere drag. Hanlan maintained the lead from start to finish, resting occasionally on his oars, awaiting Elliott, who kept a few lengths behind. Hanlan, who had been well behind, had left the Englishman a quarter of a mile in the rear at the end of the race. Hanlan exerted himself, a few yards from the finish Hanlan stopped and threw a kiss to the cheering multitude. Elliott who was completely done up, slowly followed Hanlan over the finishing line. The distance was 21 miles, 30 seconds. The defeat, as disappointed the Tynesiders, but was not unexpected.

Washington, D.C., June 14.—The condition of the disputed legislation is as follows: The legislative appropriation bill, sometimes known as a supplementary bill, containing the prohibitive clauses relating to the election of the President, has been passed by the House of Representatives. The bill was approved. Then the remainder of the appropriations usually placed in that bill were made into a separate bill, containing the prohibitive clauses to the pay of election supervisors and marshals, and this was passed on Tuesday. The Republicans charge that this action was taken so that whatever the President's action might be toward the bill, containing the prohibitive clauses, the members of Congress would get their pay.
