

Three years ago not a drop of lager | was made in Kingston, and very little was drunk here. Mr. Bejus' German instincts told him that for Canadian summers lager must be the prevailing beve rage, just as it is on the American side in all large places. He began the manufacture confidently, yet the results exceeded his anticipations. Lager rapidly became the local refresher. His former lucrative manufacture of the heavy ales and beer was relegated to a secondary place, and last year a great extension o business capacity was demanded. The work became an enterprise, since Mr. Bajus put up a building unequalled in the city for strength and completeness. The addition is a stone adifice, the dome of which is 70 feet from the ground, and affords a fine view of Ostavaqui Bay and East End. Looking down upon the Brewery roofs you can judge of the large area covered by the establishment, the frontage being 204 feet, and also of the order and neatness of the yard, with driving sheds, cooper shop, stables, wood yard, all enclosed by a neat stone fence. THE NEW BUILDING

was built by Mr. Isaac Newlands, under New York plans, already successfully Garvin, J Gibson, C R Flanders, G-8. proven there in large breweries. The walls are four and a half feet thick with stone, felt and wood. Portland cement was used in pointing, and it is as hard as the stone itself, thus settling local differences of opinion as to its suitability The roof and joists (all firmly bolted) are of iron, twenty five tone of which is con tained in this new addition. The inner doors alone have felt linings six inches thick. There are three sets of windows. which with the thick walls preserve the air at about 38° farenheit at all times Over 800 tons of ice are stored building -no small weight to sustain over the vaults. No wonder the walls were

made heavy. THE MACHINERY. .

The old and new parts are completely fitted with modern machinery. The en gine which drives it is an efficient ten horse power, nearly twenty years old and a monument of the good work turned out in the Kingston Foundry in these days as well as now. The boiler of 4: h. p. is new, and drives two engines, a poney pamp, and the belting.

A mill for cracking malt was imported from Brooklyn; the boiler has 75 barrels of capacity; the fermenting room contains six lager tube of 1,500 gallons each; the cooler is the finest in Canada, costing \$800, and being an evidence of what small quantity of copper metal can cost. THE CELLARS AND BOOMS.

The lager store vault will keep 10,00 gallons cool at a time. There are fix cellars in all, all arched and flagged of floored with cement.

The ale vaults are 72 feet long, and yet no space is unoccupied. In addition to these cellars; there are grain ware houses, malt room, boiler rooms office. The whole building is an avenue in itself, as the visitor will find in mak ing a circuit.

The brewing in the two departments of heavy and light beer can work up to 500 barrels per week, and if the trade increasitems of Mr. Bajus' business, since his lager has its friends far east and west. applaude Even Toronte, a city of great brewers, is one of its tributaries.

CLEANLINESS. The great care of the brewers is whol someness. The ventilation of the buildng, from cellar to attic, is perfect. The malt is closed up in the shafts, so that none of the dust shall enter the building the vicinity of the boiler is kept smooth and slean as a table; all the van t themselves so favourably as to merit a floors are washed and flushed daily; indeed everything is scrupulously cleawhile the air is cool and inoffensive. large well supplies water for cooling pur poses, but the water works water, filtered, is used for the browing.

THE GENUINE LAGER.
