to His authority no matter what position they might occupy, or by whom the authority, derived from the Saprene Being, might be administered. In styr respect he entrusted certain things to themselves. For instance, in some counries there was Monarchical Government : in other countries Republican Government prevailed, and in other nations Democracy ruled. All these systems of government were carried out by the will of the people, and when the people adopted certain laws and approved certain authority, it was their bounden duty to obey them. The text again marked out the Supreme Being as the object of fear, by which was not meant a feeling which might alienate them from God. St. John spoke of it as perfect love; and fear and reverence led to shat love which secured obedience. thought of the present day, the ten dency of which was to shift from God the origin and centre of all power and force, and convey it to some of the objects of His creative hand. The passage of Scripture under consideration indicated that He and He alone should be the object of fear and reverence. precept also applied to the present times, when men sought something new not only in religion but in society, when the example was followed (to some extent) of those whose destructive characters the Pasimisthad written of. The example might not be followed in its literal sense. but it was copied in regard to some or the time-honored institutions, and with

They were taught that whether in the Church or State, those in authority were moving there by God's command, and by his inherent power in these two bodies. They were not to speak evil of dignity.
