Then there is a 'selflift,' an apparatus for peculiar diseases of women. A 'kneading couch,' and an instrument called the 'block,' for bringing into action the transverse muscles. Proceeding upstairs we beheld the medicated sulphur bath apparatus, which is very ingeniously contrived with a view to the proprieties. The patient may sit in the bath and talk with the physician without being seen. The bed rooms for patients are bicely arranged, the furniture in each being very neat and comfortable.
