PROB. - Fresh winds, cloudy weather with rain areas and thunder storms.

SENATOR. - A prominent business man, who was out last night, had the artery of one arm cut, it is alleged by the use of a knife, in the hands of a man crazed by liquor. A sum of money is also said to be lost. The wounded man avers that the wound was the result of an accident.

ANOTHER WEDDING. - The pleasant announcement is made elsewhere of the nuptials of Mr. Charles Colligan, late of Kingston, and Miss Neilson. The event is interesting to a large circle of friends. The wedding, and certainly happy, couple left for their future home in New York State this morning, attended by many good wishes.

FIREMEN'S PARADE. - Last evening the "Alert" Fire Company paraded, making quite a circuit of the city. The band of the 47th Batt. headed the procession, which attracted a great deal of attention. The excursion to-morrow of the Brigade is so much talked of that it will be a great surprise to us if the firemen are not accompanied by many friends.

CHANGES IN DIFFERENT LOCALITIES. - Little fairy like cottages could be seen here and there nesting among the foliage on island and main shore. But the greatest surprise came upon us as we approached the Camp Ground of the Thousand Island Park. Last year Hub Island, at this point, was a bare rock, but to-day upon its back there stands a palace, the observatory of which rises to an altitude of seventy feet from the water. How such a building could have been raised, finished and furnished in the interval of our last visit to these parts passes our understanding. But there it is, and you may walk up its broad, majestic steps in to the spacious office, and, while registering your name, imagine you are in the Grand Central of Chicago, the Occidental of San Francisco, or any other modern city hotel. You will by no means realize the fact that you are upon a mere rock in the great group of St. Lawrence. You are here within almost a stone's throw of the Camp Ground. Here a man may enjoy life exactly to suit his tastes. The whole range of human activity is open to him, from piracy to piety, and no one is driven him to either extreme. If a man cannot enjoy life here it would be difficult to know where he could. This new hotel is called the "Hub House," and George W. Best is proprietor. There is every prospect of its being the "best" place for the accommodation of the general public in these parts. A flotilla of boats, small steamers, swimming baths and music are among the attractions of the "Hub." We left the "Junia," crossed over to

THE CAMP GROUND, in a skiff at this point, and walked through the grounds noting some of the improvements that have been made during the past year. Almost the first new feature that attracted our notice was the medical establishment of Dr. E. B. Hopkins, of Madison, N. Y., formerly of Boston. We were introduced to the Doctor, who kindly took us through the building. We first came to the general parlour, then to the consulting room, from there into an apartment devoted to the physical treatment of invalids, where we beheld a number of queer looking machines, the first being what is termed the "manipulator," for the treatment of nervous diseases. A crank is turned and machinery is put in motion, acting upon the muscular system. Next was the "health lot," by which the physician may ascertain the amount of strength the patient possesses. Then there is a "self-life," an apparatus for peculiar diseases of women. A "kneading couch," and an instrument called the "block," for bringing into action the transverse muscles. Proceeding upstairs we beheld the medicated sulphur bath apparatus, which is very ingeniously contrived with a view to the proprieties. The patient may sit in the bath and talk with the physician without being seen. The bed rooms for patients are nicely arranged, the furniture in each being very neat and comfortable. This medical establishment is situated close to the hotel, and is a perfect affair in every respect. There are some REMARKABLY HANDSOME COTTAGES being erected in all directions. Lots have been sold at unusually high prices. One lot sold for \$700 last week. Three or four hundred dollars is a common price for good lots, and the probability is the price will increase very much. Great attention has been paid to the floral department of the grounds. The wild aspect of the camp is giving way to the progress of good taste, and the park will soon be famous for its floral splendours making it a very paradise in which to dwell for a season. Some of the cottages now in process of construction are remarkable for their great size and superior finish. Whatever may be said in regard to the religious advancement of the park, one thing is certain, its success as a place of summer resort is permanently established. It will undoubtedly grow year by year and be one of the most famous places in the world. There is nothing to hinder it. Whether it will always maintain a high religious reputation no one can say; it will always we think, be very moral and always be a place of great interest and advantage to the people who visit it. It is a place of the most beautiful scenery and the most beautiful human reality. Some other interesting features we noticed in the evening were the "Hub House." We hope this feature will start a newspaper at the island which, in order to be in keeping with its surroundings, should be called the "Paradise Record."

DOWN THE RIVER. PASSING OBSERVATIONS OF A TRAVELLER. - GANANOQUE - THE CAMP GROUND - HUB HOUSE, ETC. It is not, as yet, an easy matter to get to the Camp Ground, the season not having fairly set in, but, luckily for us, we had the pleasure of running against the obliging Mr. Albert Britton, at Gananoque, who, in conjunction with several other gentlemen, had chartered the little steamer "Junia," on Dominion Day, for an afternoon's trip among the Thousand Islands. The party consisted of a number of young ladies and gentlemen, the suite of Gananoque. Through the courtesy of Mr. Britton we were permitted to take passage in this craft, and enjoy the exhilarating breezes of the St. Lawrence. A number of the gentlemen present being accomplished vocalists the pleasure of the trip was enhanced by the performance of some very excellent glee solos, etc. The "Junia" is most admirably adapted for pleasure excursions of this kind, and will carry a hundred and fifty persons at a stretch, though seventy-five makes a comfortable number. Mr. M. C. Rogers, of Clayton, is the Captain, and it is a real pleasure to sit at his side in his little wheel house and hear him discourse upon the many beauties through which his steamer glides with the swiftness of an arrow, so to speak. We have frequently had occasion to write of the features of Gananoque, and we here reiterate that it is one of the most attractive spots on the river. There is something exceedingly quaint in the character of its buildings, the old stone factories grouped about on the shores of the river with here and there a fall or slide, its landing street, its handsome English church and other sacred edifices, and its rich background of water and islands. Possessing all the attractions of a watering place, it has also the advantages of an enterprising town, with its highly cultivated society. No wonder people from the far inland come here to breathe the pure under canvass when they can, at the same time enjoy the highest standard of social intercourse if they so desire. As we passed down the river we noticed many
