Sad Drowning Case.

Last evening about 9 p.m. an accident t a very painful character occurred just after the barge 'Minnie loaded with cord wood had passed through the locks at Kingston Mills. A young wan named Patrick Denn, aged about 22 years, was busily engaged in coiling some rope hear the cabin; while engaged in pulling the ope it came too suddenly and he slipped tumbling overboard. A board was thrown from the barge to him, but he was so much exhausted as to be unable to reach it.
