We congratulate our old friend Hugh McKinnon, of Belleville, on his victory over the redoubtable Ross, hitherto the reputed champion of the world in heavy weight athletics. Already his list of victories is a long one; his medals are more than he can wear upon his capaa profuse collection which his venerable mother at her home in Paris, Ontario, shows with pardonable pride to his friends who visit her. By all means let him be sent to England to prove that on terra firma, as well as upon the limpid element, Canada can successfully invite and vanquish the com stition of the

## THE CONSTITUTIONAL QUESTION.

The re-reference of the Letellier question back to Canada for settlement is evidently the course decided upon by the Imperial authorities, that is if the latest cabled information is to be relied upon. We cannot see how an invited decision, especially in a matter in which the extent of the prerogative of the Crown is the very question at issue, would have been three years imprisonment and the rest the alightest interference with Canadian independence or any of our interests - not nearly so much so, at anyrate, as the selection of one city from among several rival civic aspirants for the honor and advantage of being the Canadian seat of Government. But we are not disposed to quarrel with this decision of the British authorities not to decide in the Letellier dispute, but to refer it back to Constipation, Sick Headache, Coming up anti mortem statement, testified that the people of Canada. The latter are certainly the most interested parties in the case. But to carry out the apirit of this Imperial non-interference with the remedy has failed. We are glad to see that a notice of motion is on the papers in the Quebec Legislature protesting against Federal Interference in provincial affaire in this matter. The 'States rights' of the sevi rat provinces must be preserved at all hazards, and the Federal attempts to abolish provincial autonomy must be resented and resisted if the fabric of Confederation as not to be effectually undermined and

#### ONTARIO GOY'T AND EDUCATION-

One of the principal embarrassments of the Opposition during the recent electoral struggle in Ontario was the difficulty in discovering any breach in the Liberal defenses where they might with the forlornest hope of success make an assault on the Liberal "citadel" issues and flank increments were trivil without stint, but without the most different success, even before the final attack and tremendous rout of the Tory besiegers on the memorable 5th of June But on no question of policy or administration could any successful charge bo brought against the Mowat Ministry Although this was true of every department of the Government, it particularly so in the matter

But the result has more than vindicated the wisdom of the step then taken. The Hon Adam Crooks, the first and present Minister of Education of Ontario, has far exceeded the sanguine expectations of his friends in his successful administration of his important department. More than this, the educational policy of the Government has even extorted the reluctant admiration of its most uncom promising opponents. This was so the last House, and will doubtless prove true in the new one.
