

BRITISH VALOUR.

A FREE FIGHT BY MEN-OF-WAR'S MEN.

A correspondent at Alexandria writes to the *Pall Mall Gazette* as follows: "The following incident has been related to me by an eye witness. During the recent stay of the English squadron in the Piraeus, those of them were drinking in a wine shop, where a party of men belonging to some Russian vessels of war engaged, and taking the bottle from them emptied the contents on the table. As may be supposed, this was not calculated to promote peacefulness of spirit; and, seeing the Russians were in proportion of twenty to three, Englishmen, one of the latter, a boatswain's mate, stepped to the door, and piped, 'Liberate our master!' In a moment all the shipmates awed by such a threat, but Jack, scorning anything but fair play, only sufficient were told off to make even numbers with the Russians. Accordingly they went in man for man to clear the aggressors. After a sanguine fight, in which chairs and tables were alike brought into requisition, this was accomplished. Prodigies of valor, my informant tells me, were performed, especially by a young officer of one of the English ships who distinguished himself by the rapidity with which he disposed one antagonist after the other. He cheerfully declined all assistance, and in the intervals between his blows addressed the Russians with, 'Come on, you beggars! we've been waiting for you for two years.' The world, however, was to come, for some French sailors, arriving just as the defeated Muscovites were ejected, claimed the right to give a few brawns touched to the work of the English sailors. The result was that the Russians reached their ships in a somewhat disorderly condition, it is not surprising that the Russian captain should have afterwards suggested to the senior British officer the advisability of selecting a different day in future for giving leave to their respective ship companies.
