THE CITY BANK ACCOUNT. The Mayor desired to answer a ques ton asked by Ald Gaskin at the last neeting of the Council in regard to the accommodation which the Council may lesire from the Merchants Bank. The other day the Council required \$14,000 for the payment of interests. He applied to the Manager of the Bank for a disount at the usual rate. In due time he communicated with the manager in Mon treal, and received a reply that a somewhat higher rate would be charged. He demurred about paying the increased rate, and a second time the Montreal manager was written to, who again stat ed that he thought larger interest should be paid. This was about three days be fore the money had to be paid. He did not consider that there was time to negotiate with other banks. He accordingly agreed to pay the additional one half per cent interest then, but gave the bank manager to understand that some definite arrangement should be arrived at for the future: that if the Merchanta Bank would not furnish discounts at the
